Easter Day is sometimes referred to as the "great day" or in Irish, Cáisce.

The English word Easter has its origins in old English – Eastre or Eostre – the name of the goddess of Spring, which was celebrated at Vernal (spring) Equinox. This year, Easter falls next Sunday, April 12 and it is determined by the Sunday after the full moon following the Spring Equinox. So the date for Easter changes each year depending on when the full moon occurs.

"We are an Easter people and Alleluia is our song" is a statement that Christians have sung and reflected on over the generations. Hope, new life, light out of the darkness are metaphors for this Easter celebration.
