Inniu cloiseann Íosa glór an Athar. 'Is tusa mo mhac muirneach. Is duit a thug mé gnaoi. (Lucás 3:21-22). Tháinig an bheannacht agus fáiltiú céanna sin anuas ar gach duine againne ar lá ár mBaisteadh, agus aon uair go mbraithimid an misneach lag, nó easpa muinín ionainn féin, ba chóir dúinn an soiscéal seo a léamh agus a ahuí.
