### Feast of St. Brigid - Mary of the Gael

St. Brigid is one of the three patron saints of Ireland. Tradition tells us that Brigid was born sometime around the year 454. Her youth, no different than that of other girls in her day, was spent in herding the family cattle, milking and making butter. Brigid felt a strong call to consecrate her life to God's service. At first her father refused her permission, but seeing her determination finally consented to her taking the veil. She received the veil and spiritual formation probably from St. Mel and stayed for a period under his direction in Ardagh.

As usually happens when someone gives powerful example Brigid became the centre of a numerous group of followers. This led her to found a double monastery in Kildare with the assistance of Bishop Conleth.

Her life depicts her as an active nun, living with her community, though often travelling for either evangelical or charitable purposes, Hospitality, almsgiving and care for the sick were her main preoccupations.

Though her monastery was very small in her lifetime, Brigid's reputation for genuine holiness earned her the title of Mary of the Gael. By the eighth century she was entitled leader of the virgins of Ireland. She died in 524 and her cult is widespread not only throughout Ireland but in a number of European countries as well. We celebrate her feast day on 1st February.
