Aontacht na gCríostaithe.

Tá seachtain ar leith – 18ú go 25ú Eanáir – leagtha amach ag Eaglaisí Críostaí ar fud an domhain chun guí ar son Aontachta Críostaí. Is é an téama do 2022 ná "Mar chonaiceamar a réalta ag éirí agus thángamar ag déanamh ómóis dó" (Maitiú 2 : 2). Tá sé de dhualgas orainn go léir guí ar son aontachta na bpobal Críostaí chun misean Dé a chomhlíonadh. Guímis, mar a dúirt Críost an oíche roimh a bhás, "ionas go mba aon iad go léir, faoi mar atá tusa, a Athair, ionamsa agus mise ionatsa; go mbeidís seo ina n-aon ionainn i dtreo go gcreidfidh an saol gur chuir tú uait mé." (Eoin17:21).

Tharla dhá mhórscoilt in Eaglais Chríost. Sa bhliain 1054 scar Eaglais an Oirthir i gConstaninople ón Eaglais sa Róimh agus tugadh Eaglais Cheartchreidmheach an Oirthir Ceartchreidmhaigh orthu . Christian Unity

The week of prayer for Christian Unity is kept throughout the world each year from 18⁻ 25 January. The theme for 2022 is: ", "We saw the star in the east and came to worship Him," Matthew 2:2. We are obliged to pray for unity among Christians so that the mission of Christ will be fulfilled. Let us pray as Jesus asked us on the night before He died, "May they all be one, Father, may they be one in us, as you are in me, and I am in you so the world may believe it was you who sent me" (John 17:21).

Two major splits occurred in the Church of Christ. In 1014 the Eastern Church in Constantinople separated from the Church in Rome and became the Orthodox Church. In the 16th century in Europe there was a schism and the Protestant Churches, Lutheran, Calvinistic and Anglican among others were established. For over a century the unity of the churches is sought. This is called Ecumenism.

Father of love you have called us to confraternity with your Son and to be witnesses to the gospel. Through the grace of the Holy Spirit enable us to overcome divisions and remain steadfast that our joy may be complete. We ask this through Jesus Christ Our Lord. Amen.
