Feast of the Baptism of Jesus

Today we celebrate the feast of the Baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist in the river Jordan. It was an important event in the history of redemption. Jesus began his public life. Each gospel lays emphasis on the anointing of Jesus with the Holy Spirit at his baptism. The heavens were opened to him and he saw the Spirit of God descend like a dove and alight on him. And a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved, with him I am well pleased. Listen to him." (Matthew 3:16-17) All the gospels refer to the heavens opening.
