Sr. Eileen - Cúinne Ainm Naofa İosa

Tá mí Eanáir gach bliain ó dheireadh an 15ú haois leagtha amach ag an Eaglais ar fud an domhain chun onóir a thabhairt d'Ainm Naofa Íosa. Is é an dara haithne a thug Dia do Mhaois sa Sean-Tiomna ná : Ná luaigh ainm an Tiarna, do Dhia, le mí-úsáid /gan ábhar. De réir na haithne seo ní foláir dúinn ainm Dé a rá le hómós amháin. Sa Tiomna Nua deir Naomh Pól linn, "i dtreo nuair a luafaí ainm Íosa go gcromfadh glúin gach neach dá bhfuil ar neamh agus ar talamh agus in ifreann agus go ndearbhódh gach teanga, in ómós do Dhia an tAthair, gurb é Íosa Críost an Tiarna" (Filipigh 2:10-11). Ó thús na Críostaíochta, b'eol do Chríostaithe cumhacht mhór ainm Íosa.Tar éis báis agus aiséirí Íosa, bhain na hAspail úsáid as ainm Íosa chun daoine a leigheas agus míorúiltí a oibriú. Holy Name of Jesus

The month of January is dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus since the end of the fifteenth century. The second commandment given to Moses is "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain. "According to this commandment we must respect God's name. In the New Testament St. Paul tells us, "...so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth" (Phil 2:10-11). From the beginning of Christianity, Christians were aware of the power of the name of Jesus. After His death and resurrection the Apostles used the name of Jesus to cure the sick and work miracles. Peter said to the cripple begging at the temple "'I have no silver or gold but what I have I give you; in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, stand up and walk" (Acts 3:6). The cripple got up and walked. Everybody was surprised by this miracle.

We can say this prayer daily. Jesus, yours is the name above all names. We praise you and give heartfelt thanks for your goodness. May we always have an abiding reverence for

your Holy Name. Amen
